Our long running dust extractor upgrade project is finally making some progress with Rod Willis, Neal McCarthy and a few helpers making changes to the Sawstop Table saw and Hammer Thicknesser/Planner extractor

This should also shorten the ducting lengths and by replacing much of the flexible hoses which are not particularly efficient. The metal ducting will also improve the dust suction at the machines.

Before entering ensure you catch the eye of who is in there and gain permission to enter. Obviously if someone is focused on welding, linishing, grinding, etc wait until they stop


